STRENGTHENING FAR-FLUNG COMMUNITIES

Those who are familiar with Judaism in Uzbekistan, know that most of the Jews are concentrated in the three largest cities: Tashkent, Samarkand, and Buchara. The little cities have small Jewish communities, and most of them do not have a *shul* or any Jewish activity because of the small numbers of Jewish families living there.

The Chief Rabbi of Uzbekistan and Middle Asia, *shliach*, Rabbi Abba Dovid Gurevitz, has made it his goal to reach out to all Jews of Uzbekistan, wherever they might be, and to bring them the light of Judaism.

He sends them *arba minim* for Sukkos, *menoros* and candles for Chanuka, *matzos* for Pesach, and so on. The distances between the capitol city and the small cities are large, and the packages do not always get to their destinations on time through the mail.

R' Gurevitz took it upon himself to visit the cities and towns that have small Jewish communities in order to strengthen them. In an exhausting trip that takes days, he visits these communities and brings pairs of t'fillin, mezuzos, siddurim, Chumashim, and other basic Jewish needs. In each place he visits, he meets with members of the community and encourages them to strengthen their observance of Torah and mitzvos.

The communities tell him about

their difficulties, in that thousands of Jews have left Uzbekistan for Eretz Yisroel or other countries, leaving them without *chazanim*, *mohelim*, etc. R' Gurevitz promised his aid in their obtaining funds to reignite organized Jewish activity, like *shuls*, classes for children, etc.

The community heads are generally from traditional families who have a warm feeling for Judaism. They are concerned about preserving the traditions among their people.

R' Gurevitz met a young community leader who was recently appointed to his position. In the course of their conversation, R' Gurevitz discovered that the man knew very little about Judaism, and had never put on t'fillin! R' Gurevitz put t'fillin on with him, and left the pair as a gift on condition that he try to get other Jews to use them.

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CHABAD UNDER ATTACK IN BNEI BRAK

Apparently the anti-Semitism around the world has affected Bnei Brak. Otherwise, there's no explanation for why the Rebbe's teachings were stolen and burnt and strewn in the streets!

It turned out that that Lag B'Omer night, talmidim from a Litvishe yeshiva in Bnei Brak stole hundreds of Sichos Kodesh and kuntreisim of D'var Malchus from the Chabad shul, and burnt or tore them, and then threw them out the window of the shul on Rechov Chazon Ish into the street

This was preceded by this group's posting flyers decrying the Lag B'Omer parades, as they do every year. It seems that these young *talmidim*, incited by these flyers, rushed to undermine the work of *hafatzas ha'maayanos*, in the most disgusting manner. The remains of the burnt *sichos* were found near the

THOUSANDS ATTEND LAG B'OMER PARADE SATELLITE BEACH FL

SATELLITE BEACH FL— With a plane above towing a banner reading "Israel, We Stand With You," about 1,000 people gathered Tuesday evening, Lag B'Omer at the Chabad Jewish Community Center with floats of Twin Towers and others, banners, a marching band, Dr. Laz, and dignitaries in open convertibles, to pledge Americans' support for Israel.

Members of Jewish organizations and Christian groups throughout Brevard County took part in an hourlong ceremony followed by a parade on State Road A1A.

U.S. Rep. Dave Weldon, R-Palm Bay, who attended along with Israel's consul general, and candidates for Congress and the County Commission, used stern words against making peace with the Palestinians.

"It is right for Israel to do what it is doing today," Weldon said. "Just as it was right for us to go into Afghanistan, it is right for Israel to go into the West Bank."

The Chabad Jewish Community Center's director, Rabbi Chaim Zvi Konikov, called the events a unity celebration in support of Israel and against the persecution of Jews.

"There's so many people in the community that want to express that we need to stand together against those that want to destroy us," Konikov said. "We need to recognize there's an enemy in order to win the war against terrorism."

The event coincided with Lag B'Omer. About 1 million children marched Tuesday in the streets of Israel to celebrate Lag B'Omer.

There were even a few Muslims showing support for Israel

The most recent bloodshed between Israelis and Palestinians began March 27, the first day of Passover. Suicide attacks in Israel, including one by an 18-year-old Palestinian woman, led to retaliatory strikes against Palestinians in the West Bank.

Don Clark, 62, of Palm Bay was among several non-Jewish supporters holding an American flag at the event. Clark, a Christian missionary to Israel, said everyone should support Israel.

"Palestinians had their chance," he said. "If they want to live there in peace, Israel said they could live there in peace."

Indialantic FL resident Mel Rabinowitz, 65, said he agreed with many supporters that the current action in the West Bank is Israel's right to defend itself.

"There isn't much Israel can do, they've given everything," Mel Rabinowitz said. "The only way peace will ever prevail is to get Arab leaders to genuinely support peace, and that would not include Yasser Arafat."

As Israel consolidated its control of the West Bank in April, President Bush instructed Israel to stop its advances, withdraw from Palestinian cities and return to the negotiating table to establish a cease-fire.

Bush also hammered Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat, saying the Palestinian leader "betrayed the hopes" of his people and did not consistently oppose terrorist activity.

Bush sent in Secretary of State Colin Powell, who met with Arafat and Israel Prime Minister Ariel Sharon. But the talks did little.

Rabbi Chaim Zvi Konikov said peace wouldn't come easily. He grew indignant when asked about Israel invading and seizing West Bank territories that were home to Palestinians.

"They wanted to throw us into the sea in 1967," he said of the 6-day war between Israel and surrounding Arab

states. "And we won it. Now we're invading their land? That's ridiculous. The purpose of the PLO (Palestinian Liberation Organization) is to destroy Israel. And these are the people that the world wants us to make peace with?"
